MA / MFA Dance Leadership and Community Practice

This programme supports a career as a creative dance teacher/leader/facilitator, developing your knowledge, confidence and entrepreneurial skills to make a difference in people's lives through creativity and dance.

Dance is a powerful tool to build relationships within communities, enable a creative outlet, support people's wellbeing, rehabilitation and enjoyment of life. Learning creative dance practice, a socially engaged and inclusive pedagogy of ethics and care, and project management, will facilitate you with the practical knowledge and skills to create opportunities for dance to thrive.

A range of expert tutors and visiting professional artists in the field provide exemplars and inspiration alongside a heart centred pedagogy. Experience of assisting top London organisations such as Trinity Laban Public Engagement provides real world experience of working with people with very different needs and is invaluable for students studying to work within, or develop, the pre-vocational, participatory dance and dance for health sectors. This programme will support your understanding of dance as a socially relevant, creative, applied, and inclusive practice, and will springboard your career in dance.

Students are supported to find their own artistic and pedagogic identity and set their own goals within a positive and nurturing environment. Study accumulates in a self-selected area of practical research where you can develop individual areas of interest and experience, leading to a MA or MFA qualification.

Develop as a dance leader and facilitator with knowledge of specialist theoretical and methodological approaches for appropriate and effective teaching and leading dance with, and for, diverse participant groups.

The programme has four key strands:

- Dance leadership and teaching develop knowledge and skills for working
 effectively to engage and support different kinds of groups, populations and
 communities through dance. Gain invaluable experience working with different
 group with organisations such as Greenwich Dance, Trinity Laban Public
 Engagement, CODA dance, Slide dance, Magpie Dance.
- Professional practice encounters with practising artists and their work, supported by our partnerships with some of the UK's leading professional artists and organisations such as People Dancing, facilitates an understanding of your entrepreneurship potential and inspires your practice.

- Understanding community dance –explore the values and principles of inclusive wide participation dance pedagogy, how it happens, and its impact on individuals and communities. Learn about planning and delivering projects, and the networks and agencies that support community dance provision.
- Artistic development progress your creative dance skills and artistic practice in a world-class conservatoire with first-class teachers and facilities.

Who is it for?

The MA / MFA Dance Leadership and Community Practice is for people from a diversity of backgrounds who have a common interest in dance as a creative, participatory art form and a desire to make a difference through dance. We encourage applications from:

- Dance or performing arts graduates who have pursued teaching / education / community as a strand of study and want to continue this as a specialism at postgraduate level
- Graduates of non-arts subjects who have a dance background and interest / experience in participatory arts / teaching / community work
- dance professionals wanting to extend their practice, broaden their skills and knowledge, extend their qualifications, enter new areas of professional practice and develop research in the area of community dance.

What are my study options?

- The MA Dance Leadership and Community Practice is a one-year (full-time) or two-year (part-time) taught programme, culminating in an independent research project.
- The **MFA Dance Leadership and Community Practice** is a two-year full-time programme. It shares the first-year taught programme with the MA. An extended independent project forms the second year, providing time for in-depth research.

The programme is on-site at Trinity Laban, so all students benefit from being part of the Trinity Laban Postgrad community of artists. With state-of-the-art dance facilities and extra-curricular opportunities such as practical technique classes*, cross programme collaborative projects and a multitude of dance and music performances.

*optional Dance Technique classes are a supplement to MA / MFA programmes of study and accrue an additional fee but are priced reasonably in relation to the cost of external classes.

What will I study?

The programme consists of core modules of practical vocational study, alongside knowledge of research practices and independent research and enquiry. As part of the learning, students are expected to undertake assisting placements with Trinity Laban Public Engagement (Children and Young People, Dance for Health) and other community dance organisations for which students are required to have a DBS check.

Entry requirements

Applicants are expected to have a first degree (or an equivalent qualification) or 5 years' professional experience in dance/performance/teaching etc.

Applicants for whom English is not their first language should demonstrate proficiency in English equivalent to IELTS 6.5 overall with minimum 5.5 in all 4 areas / Trinity College London – Integrated Skills in English III (ISEIII). Trinity Laban website provides guidance on the standard expected by reference to acceptable English Language qualifications. In addition, meeting external requirements of UK Visas and Immigration is essential.

Entry to this programme is initially by submitting a UCAS application by following the Link on the How To Apply page on the Trinity Laban website: How to Apply - Trinity Laban.

Applicants will then be invited to:

- o upload video submissions to Embark and on-line interview via zoom.
- Video documents:

Video documents are so the panel can see you in an embodied practice and assess your potential to be communicative through moving and engage others in moving. It can be filmed in any space available to you and you can record an introduction to your video documents. Guideline for length: around 10 minutes and it can include any of the following:

- dancing material from a dance/movement class (this can be in any movement genre) or doing a movement practice.
- Footage of movement improvisation with some information of the basis or inspiration for the improvisation. (guideline for length: 2-4 minutes)
- Addition Option: footage of you teaching dance, or facilitating a workshop in a community/educational setting. (Please ensure you have the consent of any other people who appear in the footage, to film and share the footage. Trinity Laban agrees only to view/share the filmed material amongst individuals on the Admissions Panel and purely for the purposes of considering your application to the Programme).

Candidates should demonstrate:

 appreciation of, and engagement with, the values and principles of Community / Participatory Dance as a professional area of practice

- understanding of the programme and how it can develop you as a dance leader and community practitioner
- potential to teach and lead dance in a range of community and participatory dance settings
- commitment to undertaking the programme, including independent study and assisting opportunities alongside timetabled classes
- A first degree (or an equivalent qualification) or 5 years' professional experience in dance/performance/teaching etc.

MFA Applicants

In addition to the above, MFA applicants should demonstrate their capacity to undertake self-directed research by submitting an initial project proposal, outlining the following:

- The reasons you wish to carry out an independent project over one academic year
- Your suitability for extended independent research in the context of an MFA Dance Leadership and Community Practice
- The nature of your intended research and a draft projected timeline with indicated outputs of research (which is understandably subject to change)

What can I do next?

The programme prepares students for a breadth of possibilities and our graduates work in a variety of settings as dance artists, facilitators, teachers, and artistic leaders. The vocational focus of the programme ensures that it continues to support graduate practitioners into the profession on an employed or independent basis.
